- Computer Literacy Programme computer trainer is appointed by the institution
- Classes of SOCs are conducted between the regular two session morning and afternoon which is included in time table
- Expert lectures on 'Entrepreneurial skills' and 'Personality development' are organized
- Library provides books of eminent and successful entrepreneurs, various journals, and magazines
- The evaluation process of SOCs is carried out through written and practical/oral exam
- For computer related courses computerized/practical examinations are conducted
- Certificates are awarded to students by the institution
